The Seminal Criterion: Character

JPM's response

Untermyer: Is not commercial credit based primarily upon money or property?

JPM: No, sir, the first thing is <u>character</u>.

Untermyer: Before money or property?

JPM: Before money or anything else. Money cannot buy it . . .


Fruit of Character
