## THE SEVEN BASIC RULES OF PROBLEM SOLVING

- Dealing with problems properly always takes more time than we think; factor in plenty of time.
- Question #1: Who is responsible to solve the problem?
- Question #2: With whom is the problem?
  - Question #3: Is the nature of the problem RELATIONAL, CONCEPTUAL, and/or EXECUTIONAL (diagram the problem).
  - Learn how to recognize problems that are outside your sphere.
  - If possible, build a balanced council to help solve problems.
- "Unsolvable problems" are often a sign to readdress a problem that was improperly solved in the past.

## A CHECKLIST FOR CHRISTIAN ETHICS

Christian ethics establishes trustworthiness in everything we do.
It always honors God's Word and reveals His ways.

- 1. RESPECT is the capstone of basic Christian ethics! It is a spiritual thing, and people will know if it is genuine or phony.
- 2. Always communicate HONESTLY and TRUTHFULLY in all situations. Do not tolerate untruthfulness in any associate you are working with or relating to.
- 3. VALUE all people—whether they are family, employees, vendors, or neighbors—as creations of God, each with a unique destiny to fulfill. Remember, whatever you want for yourself, want for them with the same intensity.
- 4. Always be POLITE. No one has an obligation to work with, serve, or be with you. Say please and thank you often.
- 5. Model a BALANCED LIFE of work, rest, family activities, recreation, and Sabbath.
- 6. Be FAIR in your financial agreements.
- 7. Christianity is NOT a rule book. Religion turns everything into rules, so be careful of "religious" ethics! Religion is the enemy of life with God.
- 8. The foundation of Christian ethics is HONESTY and INTEGRITY.
- 9. When you are facing a decision and have a direction in mind, ask yourself the following QUESTIONS (if you can't come to peace, then continue in ethical reflection until you do):
  Am I relationally right or just technically right?
  Is it consistent with God's Word?
  - Is it consistent with God's ways?Do I want the same thing for my neighbor or work associate that I
  - want for myself?

    Is this decision based in biblical and Kingdom reality, not just an
  - "I'm going to win" reality?

    Can I identify the biblical principles upon which the decision is based?
  - ☐ Have I heard the voice of God in my reflections?
  - ☐ Have I "embraced the cross?"
  - ☐ Will this decision please Jesus?
